
- Continue serving our constituents to the best of our abilities

	Plan of Action In an attempt to be proactive, a plan of action was developed to address the seriousness and fluidness of the COVID-19 Outbreak.				
March 3	Administration meets to discuss virus.				
March 5	Pastors are to prepare to shut down churches.				
March 11	The World Health Organization declares COVID-19 a pandemic.				
March 12	Consultation with medical personnel. MConitoring and following the advice of the CDC and the local health departments and city guidelines. All Conference events suspended until further notice. All office travel suspended.				
March 15	Executive Committee meeting.				
March 16	COVID-19 Crisis Management Team organized. Emergency pastors meeting. Pastors asked to setup every church for online giving and educate members on online giving options. Advised pastors to follow local government guidelines. Churches to preparation on the services.				
March 17	Conference office employees prepare to work remotely; last day in office.				
March 13	Schools begin shutting down.				
March 18	Conference office transitions from on-site to remote operations.				
March 19	Emergency Executive Committee meeting; COVID-19 Crisis Team meets; Emergency pastors meeting; Conference COVID-19 Statement posted; President's letter goes out to all members. Pastors instructed to close all buildings and setup live streaming.				
March 23	All schools shut down.				
March 26	Informed Executive Committee that all church buildings had shut down and churches would continue services online.				
April 1	Crisis Team meets.				
April 2	Meeting with pastors; they are instructed to cease all face to face small groups meetings and rely on video, phone or online meetings.				
April 5	Executive Committee Meeting.
